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
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Dear readers

# **Astatine**

### From the AT staff

2019 will be an important year for the programme Advanced Technology, as we are 2. How the curriculum is set-up to up for reaccreditation.

This sentence may require some explanation. First of all, what is accreditation? Every government funded academic programme requires a valid accreditation which is required for handing out diplomas to its students. Well, at least diplomas that allows alumni of Advanced Technology to call themselves Bachelors of Science and entitles them to enroll in a Masters programme. So that makes accreditation a serious business for both students and staff alike.

The whole process of reaccreditation has to be done every six years and takes, in total, about one year. Why so long? Well the programme has to prove that it is up to par on several points. This is proven with the aid of a so-called Self Evaluation Report in which the programme reflects on its performance. Yes, also the prorgamme has to reflect and determine from that its weak and strong points and debate possible improvements. This has to be done in four major categories:

1. The vision of the programme and the intended learning outcomes, i.e. the final qualifications of stu-

- dents that finish the programme.
- realize these qualifications.
- 3. How tests are made to check that students have acquired these qualifications.
- 4. The outcome, how do students perform.

This report of just 16 pages, plus introduction and appendices has to be written before the summer of 2019 and will be evaluated by a panel which during a visit in November 2019 will also talk to all stakeholders, including several students and alumni. Associated to this visit the panel will for sure have a look at work done by students. This can be any exam, including whether this was a proper exam, with justifiable criteria and a few dozen bachelors theses will be looked upon. A serious visit.

If everything goes well, the panel will have a positive conclusion and advices for improvements and students and alumni know that they have a good and solid education. But, what if not...? "In this process failure is not an option." That is a quote attributed to Gene Kranz, the flight director of NASA's Apollo programme which intended to put a man on the moon. Luckily we have a much easier task.


In chronological order that would be: Czech Republic, where we will first go to Prague and then to Brno for 2 days each.



# Calling Shotgun

### The Rules

The line between harmony and chaos is quite thin. There are but a few behavioural conceits that distinguish us from wild animals, that separates us from complete civil breakdown, that preserves the delicate and precarious balance separating us from total anarchy. Among them, few codes of conduct are more sacred, more vital, or more essential to the continuity of our fragile existence than the official rules for calling shotgun.

### Rule 1 - Saying the word 'Shotgun'

# From 0 to 200

## REAL QUICK



What started off as a bunch of Russians doing Russians things -Weird stuff with snowescalated (or de-escalated) quite quickly. Before they realised it the Americans did what Americans did and stole the idea, but without the ice and about 200 years later, with the French trying but not really succeeding in between. And thus we now live in the golden age of what the Spanish call "a Russian Mountain", what the Russians call "an American Mountain" and what the Dutch call "an Eight Track"-since we lack any creativity whatsoever. It is what the Americans dubbed, quite accurately, a roller coaster. [1]

Love them or hate them, anyone who is an Engineer at heart will take a moment to appreciate the sight of a roller coaster. They are a marvel of engineering, and, since the introduction of the computer, are becoming increasingly better. They are designed solely for the purpose of entertainment, bringing joy to the life of countless passengers, as they are carefully designed to do just that. If everyone had a few million dollars at hand, they would probably be a horrible but not very regrettable impulse purchase. And all of that by the most common force in our lives, gravity.

Albeit, not always.

The first implementations of launches on roller coasters were actually still powered by gravity. By dropping a weight, a cable was wound that would pull the train forward. This system could not be used on very tall rides, and was only used in very early installations. A more widely used system is the Linear Induction Motor (LIM) or Linear Synchronous Motor (LSM) launch. By using an AC signal and a series of alternating magnets, the train is propelled forwards, effectively turning the roller coaster into a sort of railgun. But whilst this system may be considered more physically sophisticated, the



acceleration tends to decrease towards the end. Luckily, the Hydraulic and Pneumatic launch system exists. They can deliver something none of the others are really capable of in comparison. To use the words of a famous mechanical engineer on another subject:


It is no surprise that the three fastest roller coasters in the world all use a hydraulic launch system. They can launch you over 120 meters up in the air without breaking a sweat. And it's only downhill from there, as the rest of the ride will seem tame. Luckily the sights at those heights make up for it. The fastest acceleration on a roller coaster pulls the trains at over 3g's, about the force astronauts experience during blast off. But inducing such forces is no easy task. They can produce a peak power of 10.000 horsepower, meaning it delivers the equivalent of a fifth of the French cavalry during the Waterloo campaign. No surprise then that it requires a motor the size of a horse. [2]

This baby hurls what is currently the second highest and third fastest roller coaster in the world with 193 kilometres an hour up to 128 meters. It consumes 2 MW during the four second acceleration of the 5500 kilogram train. And if that failed to take your breath away, the view of lake Eerie will most probably [4]. It can do so based on one simple assumption and a bunch of not so simple engineering: "Fluids

are incompressible". This is off course used in all Hydraulics, as it implies that pushing a fluid through a valve should move a valve on another end of said fluid. To produce so much power, the fact that gasses are compressible is used. Below is a schematic representation of the inner workings of a hydraulic motor. Keep in mind Top Thrill Dragster combines 32, but the basic principles remain the same.



*Schematic representation of a hydraulic launch system* [5]

The magic happens in compartment (32). The red part is filled with an oil by a pump. This causes the gas filled green part to shrink, and the nitrogen in (35) is compressed up to 320 bars. If the train is ready, the valve in (41) is released, the oil is able to flow again and the gas can decompress, fast. The oil can flow at 350 liters a minute into the hydraulic motor (22). This motor, and the other 32, are attached to a cable drum, which is spun by the motors. The cable drum pulls a catch car (17) towards it, taking the train behind it with it. The catch car return to the start of the launch, a new train is mounted before it, and after about a minute the system is pressurized again.

This is of course a major over simplification of the whole system. A ton of safety mechanisms are skipped. The system will never utilise all its motors at once. If it would, one would most likely not be able to sustain the G-forces produced. Due the large pressures and high speeds of components, a lot of friction heat is produced. These launch systems are sadly very prone to injuries like fires, and are not easy to repair. This reliability has caused the hydraulic launch system to go out of favour after about a decade. Which is a real shame. Whilst they are relatively simple in design and easy on energy consumption, as no energy is required during down time, they are a pain because of the magnitudes of power

they have been designed for. Yet all these gentle giants were supposed to do was entertain the public.

This article is simply an homage to hydraulic launches, and in no way does such a system guarantee a thrilling experience. But compared to the traditional lift hill, which builds suspense gradually, a launch does so too, but

releases all that anticipation in a short burst filled with adrenaline, dopamine and happiness. And hydraulics keep truer to the nature of roller coasters than the more popular LIM and LSM methods. No complicated magnetic fields and alternating currents, but applying Newtons third law in a complicated manner to overcome gravity.

This year, for example, we decided to place the motor underwater in a special housing. This so called pod motor is one of our major projects and the application is quite unique in the solar boat scene. Commercially it isn't applied

much either. Nevertheless, we decided to take on the challenge together with a few partners. The motor will be custom made and housed in a nacelle, which is made out of milled aluminum. At first the design seemed quite doable. But then, a few weeks later, the real engineering kicks in! Out of the blue you have to solve problems you didn't think of at first.

That's what makes being part of a student team interesting.

Working out your idea from sketch to product and solving problems along the design process. Personally, that is one of the biggest reasons why I joined Solar Boat Twente. Currently two AT students are part of our team: Sander Oosterveld and me (Mark Heimgartner).

Sander mainly focuses on coding software which includes data acquisition and designing the power electronics system which comprises PCB design and soldering. I have been busy with designing the hydrofoils in which I have used programs like Matlab, Solidworks, Ansys and Xfoil.

Besides having technical tasks, you could also help with external relations or public relations. As the design phase is being completed, the coming months we will mainly focus on testing, visiting big events such as Hannover Messe, and eventually racing.

Instead of having one race, we have several. The first race is in Akkrum at the end of May and several more will follow in June. hen, beginning of July, the moment is finally there to participate in the World Championships in Monaco! Here we will compete in an endurance race, sprint and slalom. After the award ceremony there will be a fancy dinner to conclude the hopefully successful race and season!

### Bo-Kaap





# **Cheerful Chef**

## 7 Layer Dip

As you may be aware, the Super Bowl 41 small container of crème fraiche recently took place, on February 3 rd. This event is supposed to center around American Football, but the real attractions are the half-time show, the epic commercials, and, of course, the snacks.

So, let me introduce you to one of my favorite Super Bowl snacks: the 7 Layer Dip! This deliciously unhealthy dip is meant to be enjoyed as a side dish, but it's so irresistible I usually treat it as a full meal!

Serves 3-4.

### You will need:

- Pulled pork or chicken. Buy 1 package, or make yourself:
  - Barbecue sauce
  - A few chicken breasts

Put the chicken breasts and the entire contents of the barbecue sauce bottle in a slow cooker. Cook on low heat until the chicken falls apart. Pull apart.

- 21 can of beans (refried if you can get
- Guacamole.

Buy 1 jar, or make yourself:

- 2 ripe avocados
- A red onion, chopped
- A tomato, chopped, the wet center removed
- 1 lime
- Some cilantro, chopped

Remove the pit and skin of the avocados. In a medium sized bowl, crush them into a pulp with a fork. Mix in the onion and tomato. Season to taste with lime, cilantro, salt and pepper.

Salsa.

Buy 1 jar, or make yourself:

- 3 tomatoes, quartered
- 1 red onion, roughly chopped
- 1 clove of garlic
- 1 red pepper, seeded and roughly chopped
- Juice of 1 lime
- Some cilantro
- Cumin

Add the tomatoes, onion, garlic, red pepper and lime juice to a blender. Blend until just chunky. Mix in Cilantro, a dash of cumin, salt and pepper. Refrigerate for an hour before serving.

- 61 bag of shredded cheese (gouda or cheddar)
- 1 jar of olives, drained and chopped

### The Recipe

Layer the ingredients in the order they are listed. You may want to leave it in the oven untill the cheese has melted. Enjoy with corn chips.
